Childhood Immunisation Programme

Vaccination is the most important thing we can do to protect ourselves and our children against ill health. Since vaccines were introduced diseases like smallpox polio and tetanus that used to kill or disable millions of people are either gone or seen very rarely. However, if people stop having vaccines it's possible for infectious diseases to spread very quickly again. Unfortunately, vaccine uptake has reduced in the last few years and doctors are seeing more cases of measles and mumps. Measles can lead to serious life-threatening complications like meningitis and mumps can cause hearing loss.

The table on page 2 explains the recommended vaccines at each age. If you have any questions or would like to discuss your child's vaccination programme please contact your practice. Appointments can be offered in the evening and weekends to make it easier for working parents to attend.

This year children in London are being offered Polio vaccine boosters after sewage samples with the virus were found across the city. Please see page 3 .

Polio vaccine boosters offered to children in London

Children in London are being offered polio vaccine boosters after sewage samples with the virus were found in multiple areas across the city.

The U.K. Health Security Agency announced Wednesday 10th August 2022 that all children between ages 1 and 9 across the capital will be eligible to receive an inactivated polio vaccine booster.

The vaccinations will ensure a high level of protection from paralysis and help reduce further spread of the virus.

While the majority of Londoners are protected from polio, the GP practices will shortly be contacting parents of eligible children aged 1 to 9 years old to offer them a top-up dose to ensure they have maximum protection from the virus. The NHS will contact you to ask you to book an appointment.

Changes to online consultation access

GP practices are getting busier and busier with high volumes of phone calls from patients and others. We know it can sometimes be hard to get through to your GP practice on the phone. The quickest and easiest way to get help from your GP practice is to submit an online consultation request via your GP practice website for those patients who are able to use this facility. You will need a computer or smartphone. Of course if you are unable to do this then do call your GP practice. All online consultations are accessible from your own GP practice's website. How do I get started with PATCHS?

- You can register for PATCHS via your GP practice website. You'll be asked to enter your email address and set a password.
- Once you have registered, you can access PATCHS by clicking the link on your GP website or opening the PATCHS app on your smartphone. Login by entering your registered email address & password.
- Choose the appropriate option and answer a few simple questions to help your GP understand your problem.
- Your answers are sent to your GP who responds as quickly as possible. Initial responses may be via online message or phone, with face-to-face or video consultation appointments scheduled if necessary.

Changes to GP Services in the Evenings and at Weekends

The NHS has asked practices to design a new service to provide appointments in the evenings and weekends (Monday to Friday evenings 6.30pm-8pm and Saturday 9am-5pm) from October 2022. Currently, patients needing to see a GP between 6.30pm and 8pm or at weekends have to travel to one of three Access Centres: Belmont; Pinn or Alexandra Avenue. The new service would be provided in rotation in one of the three practices in the Primary Care Network (PCN) -Honeypot, Bacon Lane and Mollison Way.

The current Access Centres:

- Are not staffed by patients' own GPs
- Are not able to view the patients' records and only acute minor issues (cough, sore throats etc) can be dealt with
- Do not provide nurse led services such as cervical smears or long term condition management
- Cannot refer patients to hospital for further treatment other than emergencies
- Require patients to travel to unfamiliar sites

At the end of June the three practices in the PCN sent a survey link to patients canvassing their views on the proposed new services. The survey had over 2,800 responses.

The survey results showed that outside normal Monday-Friday opening :

- 79% of patients said they would be willing to travel to one of the other surgeries for an appointment
- 50% of patients did not express a preference for evening (23.5%) or Saturday (21.8%) appointments but said that it would depend on when they needed help
- 55.4% of patients said it would be helpful to see any health professional appropriate to their needs (GP, nurse, pharmacist healthcare assistant)28.1% said GP only and 16.5% GP or nurse only
- Patients would welcome the availability of a range of appointments: medication reviews, cervical smears, wound dressings and blood tests
- 95% of patients said they preferred face to face appointments but also said telephone (29.7%) or video call 22.5% would be acceptable depending on need
- 86% of patients would prefer to call the practice to make an appointment

Several patients commented on the difficulty of making appointments during the working day and welcomed the ability to attend in the evening after work or at the weekend.

Thank you to all those patients who took part in the survey.

As a result of feedback from the survey and discussion in the three practices, additional appointments will be available from 1st October 2022. Appointments will be allocated based on size of practice population but patients may be offered an appointment at any one of the three surgeries.

In addition extra phlebotomy (blood test) appointments will be offered on Saturday mornings.
